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FOUNDERS' LETTER

Hello and Welcome, TCP Mentees, Friends, and Families! Team TCP wishes you a **Happy New Year 2025!**

We are excited to share the **fourth edition** of our newsletter, and have many updates to share, so buckle up!

2024 was a significant year for us—we expanded our team (three new members joining us), offered 25 Master Classes and an Essay Bootcamp for our applicant cohort (TCP24), and introduced the TCP25 cohort to the college application process through major selection and college research Master Classes.

We will start off the upcoming year by welcoming the TCP25 cohort into the start of the **application process**—we will be increasing the **frequency** of our meetings and starting them on completing the various application requirements! Based on our TCP24 cohort's feedback, we have curated an **updated list of Master Classes**, and will be sharing the **calendar** with everyone soon—please keep an eye out for our email. A copy of our consolidated 2025 calendar covering all cohorts is included later in this newsletter.

Over the last three months, we spent most of our time working with the TCP24 cohort on their Early round applications—a review of our WhatsApp group chats in October showed our most used words to be editing, proofing, word count, deadline, and Common App! In November, we supported 21 applications to the University of California (UC), amid our team coming together for a training session (Amanda joining us in person in Bangalore!). Since December, our WhatsApp groups have been continuously buzzing with the news of some stellar acceptances—congratulations to our mentees heading to college in the fall of 2025! The list of college acceptances follows in the next section.

Here are some numbers to better understand **our early admission season**. Most mentees applied to an average of **four schools** in the early round.

Number of students who applied early: 26

Number of acceptances received so far: 43

Total Scholarships offered: \$1,731,288

Submissions for the **Regular admissions cycle** started in **November**, with the majority now submitted, and the remainder due in the coming days. Our mentees will be receiving results from colleges through the **end of March**. We will publish the complete admissions cycle results in the **May** edition of our newsletter!

Our **younger mentees** have also been busy! In addition to their regular meetings, many of them have started shortlisting and applying for **summer programs**, with a few already receiving their acceptances. We will share more news on this in our **next newsletter**.

Meghna recently visited Maker's Asylum in Goa, where she viewed some interesting projects created by the participants, including a tennis racquet that measures the force of the serve using the colors of a traffic stoplight, and a harp that is played without strings! We are keen to introduce this space to our younger mentees to bolster their creativity and explore their interests!

In other updates, some **major changes** to the format of the **ACT** have been announced for 2025. And for the **SAT**, a **new test date** has been added in the month of **September**. We have provided our related recommendations further in the newsletter.

Finally, our mentees from **previous application cohorts** have generously shared pictures and "insider updates" from their **college campuses**—some of these **photos** can be found at the end of the newsletter!

Here's to a fruitful application decision season, and an eventful start for our TCP25 applicant cohort.

TEST UPDATES

We have some breaking updates for the ACT and the SAT!

ACT

- The ACT will be online from Spring 2025 (TBD: April - July 2025).
- The exam duration reduces to two hours (fewer questions per section).
- Science will become optional.
- Due to these major changes, we recommend mentees to not consider opting for the ACT this year, providing time for the changes to be implemented.

SAT

- The College Board has added an additional 2025 SAT test date: September 13.
- This allows mentees to better plan their two SAT attempts over the course of the year.
- We will discuss this further and plan for each mentee in our one-on-one meetings.

WRITING AND STUDY SKILLS CENTER

Productive School Breaks Master Class!

Our Writing and Study Skills Center has successfully supported numerous mentees across all cohorts by offering one-on-one customized writing coaching and fostering improved study habits. Watching each mentee enhance their grades and build self-confidence has been a gratifying experience.


BETWEEN THE LINES: OUR PICKS

Discover what's on our team's book shelves!

Shruti Srivastava

In *The Anxious Generation*: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood Is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness, Jonathan Haidt explores the alarming rise in mental health issues among adolescents, particularly since the 2010s. He attributes this crisis to the "Great Rewiring of Childhood," where children's activities shifted from physical, play-based interactions to screen-heavy, digital engagement. In the book, Haidt highlights the adverse effects of smartphones and social media, including sleep deprivation, social comparison, and fragmented attention, particularly among teenage girls.

The book provides compelling data on the link between increased screen time and rising rates of anxiety and depression. Despite critiques of economic and academic pressures also being a part of the problem, the book serves as an essential resource for parents, educators, and policymakers. It calls for balancing technology use with unstructured, real-world play to ensure healthier mental and emotional development for future generations.

The Midnight Library by Matt Haig is one of those books that quietly settles into your heart and makes you reflect on life's endless "what ifs." It tells the story of Nora Seed, who finds herself in a mystical library suspended between life and death. Each book in the library represents a different version of her life, a result of the choices she did or did not make.

What I loved most about this book was its simplicity in tackling complex emotions. It does not lecture or overwhelm, but gently nudges one to think about regret, fulfillment, and the beauty of imperfection. It is a book for anyone who has ever wondered about the paths not taken. By its end, *The Midnight Library* leaves one with a renewed sense of perspective, a little more willingness to appreciate the imperfect beauty of one's own life, and is a comforting reminder that the life we're living might just be enough.




MENTEES' BOOK BUZZ

My Brilliant Friend - from a Grade 10 student in Singapore


I loved reading *My Brilliant Friend* by Elena Ferrante (a pseudonym for the true author), that follows two girls: Elena and her confidante/rival Lila, from ages 6 to 16 as they grow up in a working-class neighborhood in Naples. Ferrante is a brilliant storyteller; the plain language she uses places the focus on the complex web of relationships between the characters and how their roles in the neighborhood dictate their actions, giving way to themes of class, gender, and identity. Most of the book follows Elena and Lila's friendship, narrated through Elena's eyes. Through her perspective, we see how they are exceptionally close yet constantly push themselves to outdo each other. For this reason, the book is often seen as a book about female experience and friendship, but I believe that Ferrante's way of writing makes this message universal. Go read it.





So You Want to Talk About Economics - from a Grade 9 student in India

Roopa Pai's book, So You Want to Talk About Economics makes economics seem simple and fun. I always thought economics was boring and only for adults, but this book changed my mind. It's written in a way that feels like you're talking to a cool, funny teacher who knows how to explain hard things without making you feel dumb. The book talks about how economics is not just about money or graphs, but about choices and how they affect the world around us. It explains big ideas like supply and demand, markets, and globalization using easy to understand examples. I especially liked the way the book connects economics to real-life stories, such as how farmers make decisions or how countries trade with each other. What makes this book extra special is the humor and simple language. It never feels like you're reading a textbook, and there are illustrations and fun facts that keep you hooked. Even if you don't like economics, this book might just change your mind like it did for me!


